Early action plan: An achiesi on plan that allows students to apply and be notified of an achiesi on decision well in advance of the regular notification dates. If admitted, the candidate is not committed to enroll; the student may reply to the offer under the college's regular or reply policy.

Early admission: Applicy under which students who have not completed high school are admitted and enroll full time in college, usually after completion of their junior year.

Early decision plan: Apl and that permits students to apply and be notified of an admission decision (and financial aid offer if applicable) well in advance of the regular notification date. Applicants agree to accept an offer of admission and, if admitted, to withdraw their applications from the colleges. There are three possible decisions for early decision applicants: admitted, deried, or not admitted but forwarded for consideration with the regular applicant pool, without prejudice.

English as a Second Language (ESL): Acourse of study designed specifically for students whose native language is not English

Exchange student program-domestic: Any arrangement between a student and a college that permits study for a sense ter or more at another college in the United States with out extending the amount of time required for a degree. See also Study abroad.

External degree program: Aprogramof study in which students earn credits toward a degree through independent study, college courses, proficiency examinations, and personal exp erience. External degree programs require minimal or no classroom attendance.

Extracurricular activities (as admission factor): Special consideration in the admissions process given for participation in both school and nonschool -related activities of inter est to the college, such as clubs, hobbies, student government, athletics, performing arts, etc.

First professional certificate (postdegree): An award that requires completion of an organized program of study designed for persons who have completed the fir a special ty or subspecial ty.

First professional degree: An award in one of the following fields: Chiropractic (DC, DOM, dertistry (DDS, DAD), makine (ND), option try (DD, osteopathic makine (DD), radbinical and Talmaic studies (NL, Rw), Pharmacy (Bharm, Pharma), pointry (Rod) DP, DAM, veterinary makine (DAM, law(IIB, JD), divinity/ministry (BD, NDv).
